#### **About Feed Ontario**

Feed Ontario is a network of 1,200 direct and affiliate food banks and hunger-relief agencies across the province. In the last year alone, Ontario's food bank network has served more than 592,300 low-income Ontarians who accessed our services over 3.6 million times.

While food banks are working hard to meet the increasing demand for our services, this demand outpacing the capacity and infrastructure of our network.

Investments into key food insecurity and poverty reduction measures are essential to both reducing this escalating demand.

#### **Ontario's Income Security & Affordability Crisis**

As detailed in Feed Ontario's recently released 2021 Hunger Report, over 592,300 people accessed emergency food support last year, visiting services more than 3.6 million times. This is an increase of ten percent and twelve percent respectively over the previous year, making it the largest single-year increase since the 2008 economic crisis. This represents one in twenty-seven Ontarians having visited a food bank in 2020-21 to address hunger.

While COVID-19 has played an undeniable role in this increase, year-over-year food bank data shows that the pandemic only accelerated a growing income insecurity and affordability crisis in Ontario. Between 2013 and 2016, overall food bank use was on the decline; however, since 2017, food bank use has steadily increased each year. Further, an analysis of recent food bank visits shows that, despite improvements to the economy, this trend is not reversing, with food bank visits in September 2021 being 32 percent higher than the September average for 2017 – 2019.

To prevent further exacerbating hunger and poverty in the coming year, Feed Ontario requests critical and much-needed investments in the existing provincial social safety net. This includes, at minimum, an inflationary increase to Ontario's social assistance rates; incremental investments in affordable and supportive housing; and improvements to Ontario's labour laws that ensure safe and secure jobs that pay a living wage.

#### **Recommendations for the 2022 Ontario Budget**

In order to reduce poverty and address Ontario's insecurity and affordability issues, Feed Ontario would like to put forward the following for inclusion in the next provincial budget:

## 1. At minimum, make an inflationary increase of 4.9% to the financial support provided through Ontario Works and the Ontario Disability Support Program.

Ontario's social assistance rates have remained frozen since 2018 and yet the cost of living, including rent, hydro, utilities, gas, and food has continued to increase. With nearly 400,000 food bank visitors citing social assistance as their primary source of income, raising OW and ODSP rates with inflation, at minimum, is essential in preventing social assistance recipients from falling deeper into poverty.

In order to reduce poverty, Feed Ontario recommends that the provincial government take a more aggressive stance by bringing social assistance rates in alignment with the Market Basket Measure, ensuring recipients are able to obtain their basic necessities, such as housing and food, each month.

# 2. Increase the investments being made into affordable and supportive housing so that people and families in Ontario do not have to choose between paying rent or having enough food to eat.

Nearly 90% of those who access food banks are rental or social housing tenants who spend the majority of their monthly income on rent, leaving very little for all other expenses. In a recent survey that Feed Ontario conducted with 300 food bank visitors from across the province, it was found that over 60% of respondents had less than \$100 left after paying their housing costs each month.

Addressing Ontario's high housing costs is essential to reducing poverty and preventing more Ontarians from having to turn to food banks for support. Feed Ontario asks the Province to commit to the recommendations detailed by the Ontario Non-Profit Housing Association, including:

- Expanding the Canada-Ontario Housing Benefit to reach 311,000 Ontarian households
- Investing in the construction of 69,000 new affordable rental homes over the next 10 years
- Building 30,000 new supportive housing units over the next 10 years; and

 Allocating a dedicated fund in 2022-23 that will be aimed solely at bringing existing community housing units into a state of good repair

## 3. Improve Ontario's Labour Laws to ensure workers have access to safe and stable employment that pays a living wage.

In the four years leading up to the pandemic, there was a 44% increase in the proportion of working Ontarians turning to food banks for support. This increase is primarily being driven by the rise in precarious employment and low-wage jobs that fall below what is needed for today's cost of living.

Ontario workers need access to quality employment opportunities that provide a stable, living wage. Further, working Ontarians need access to essential supports, including paid sick days and affordable childcare. In order to reduce poverty and ensure fewer people need to turn to food banks for support, Feed Ontario asks the provincial government to:

- Increase the number of provincially legislated sick days from three to five and make them a permanent provision beyond the pandemic. This will ensure that workers do not have to choose between earning enough income or following public health requirements.
- Make childcare more affordable by retaining current top-ups to the Ontario Child Care Tax Credit and utilizing the federal government's childcare investments to build a high quality childcare system.

Feed Ontario believes that the provincial government shares its vision of ending hunger and poverty in Ontario and that together we can build a healthier more equitable province for everyone who calls it home.
