Feed Ontario: Working to end hunger

Feed Ontario is the province's largest collective of hunger-relief organizations, representing more than 1,200 food banks and community agencies across Ontario.

Together, we distribute millions of pounds of fresh and nutritious food to more than 1 million people in need each year.

As we work to end hunger, our efforts are focused under three key pillars:

FeedON

We [distribute](#) fresh and essential food to food banks across the province.

Feed Possibility

We [provide](#) training, resources, and support to help food banks strengthen their programs and operations.

Feed Change

We [advance](#) research using real-time food bank use data and advocate for policy solutions that address the root causes of food insecurity and poverty.

Our commitment to Truth and Reconciliation and DEIB

Feed Ontario acknowledges that our work takes place on the traditional and ancestral territories of many diverse Indigenous, First Nations, Inuit, and Métis peoples. We also recognize the historical and lasting impacts of colonization, including the ongoing relationship between colonial systems and food insecurity.

As part of our ongoing commitment to reconciliation, equity, and inclusion, Feed Ontario completed both a Truth and Reconciliation audit and a Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging (DEIB) audit to inform the development of multi-year strategies that guide our work in these areas.

In 2025, we began implementing these strategies and made meaningful progress toward our first-year goals. Key initiatives included expanding staff learning and development opportunities, advancing internal policies and practices that foster equity and inclusion, and providing webinars and educational resources to food banks across Ontario.

We believe that advancing Truth and Reconciliation and embedding DEIB principles throughout our work are essential to creating an Ontario where everyone has access to the food they need and where everyone feels they belong.

This year, we provided more food than ever before, built new partnerships across the province to expand our reach, and responded quickly when it mattered most. And none of this would have been possible without you.

On behalf of Feed Ontario, the provincial food bank network, and the people and families we serve, thank you. Your generosity and commitment are helping to ensure that people facing hunger have access to the food they need today, while supporting long-term solutions that will help end hunger tomorrow.

Last year, [more than 1 million people in Ontario](#) turned to food banks for help, visiting services more than 8 million times. Once again, this marks the highest level of need on record. It is a reality that we will never get used to, but one we remain committed to addressing.

The impact of hunger on children, seniors, adults, and families cannot be understated, and its effects extend far beyond the people experiencing it. As we shared in our [2025 Hunger Report](#), hunger increases strain on our healthcare system, disrupts housing stability, contributes to homelessness, and challenges the strength and resilience of communities across Ontario.

We know that when food bank visits go up, the health and well-being of Ontarians goes down.

Yet even in the face of growing need, there is reason for hope. The generosity of donors, partners, volunteers, and communities across Ontario continues to make a meaningful difference.

Together, we have provided more food than ever before, expanded our reach through new partnerships, strengthened the resilience of Ontario's food bank network, and [responded quickly during times of emergency](#).

Hunger is not a problem that can be solved overnight. But when we work together, we are making progress by ensuring people and families have the food they need today while continuing to advance solutions that will help reduce the need for food banks in the future.

Thank you for being part of this work and for helping build a stronger, healthier, and more food-secure Ontario.

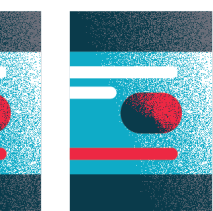

When food bank visits went up, we built solutions together.

By working together with food banks, community organizations, growers, businesses, and supporters, we strengthened our collective response to hunger. Here are just a few of the ways we made an impact together.

We increased access to fresh food:

Through our partnership with the Leamington Food Hub, we increased access to fresh, locally grown food for communities across Ontario.

In total, 3.2 million pounds of fresh produce, including tomatoes, cucumbers, and peppers, were delivered throughout the year. To help food banks distribute these donations more efficiently, we created a mixed pallet produce program to provide smaller, shareable quantities with the network, reducing spoilage and ensuring more fresh food reached the people and families who needed it most.

Supported by over 30 farms in the Windsor-Essex region, we delivered

fresh produce to more than 30 communities, including members of the Ontario Federation of Indigenous Friendship Centres and rural food banks. In addition to sharing produce, the [Farm to Food Program](#) also maximized the impact of every donation. Produce that was not suitable for inclusion in food deliveries was transformed into healthy prepared meals, such as soup, at UHC Hub of Opportunity's state-of-the-art kitchen facilities. This approach reduced food waste, created local employment opportunities for culinary apprentices, and increased the amount of ready-to-share food available to communities.

In September, we visited these facilities with our partner, Ontario Power Generation, whose support helps make this innovative program possible. Together, we saw firsthand how collaboration can increase access to healthy food, strengthen local communities, and create solutions that make a difference.

We expanded capacity in Northern Ontario:

As more people across the province turn to food banks for support, we are strengthening our network's capacity to help food banks respond to growing demand in their communities.

This year, we partnered with Food Banks Canada and local businesses to support [the expansion of the Cochrane Food Bank's warehouse space](#).

Cochrane was identified as a priority region, where limited warehouse capacity made it difficult for the food bank hub to receive and distribute enough food to meet growing need across Northeastern Ontario.

As a result of this collaborative effort, the Cochrane Food Bank can now

operate five days a week and extend its reach further north, helping address critical service gaps in First Nations and remote communities. Since the expansion, the food bank has welcomed six new agency partners, increasing its network from 15 to 21 organizations serving communities across the region.

The additional capacity has also strengthened support locally, allowing the Cochrane Food Bank to increase the number of people it serves by 40%. Together, these initiatives have strengthened the region's ability to respond to rising demand and improved access to food for communities across Northeastern Ontario.

PARTNER SPOTLIGHT *Longo's*

For the past five years, Longo's has supported Feed Ontario through its Neighbours in Need Campaign, helping to ensure food banks across the province have access to nutritious food for the people and families they serve.

Through this partnership, Longo's donates between 80 and 120 pallets of food each year in support of our [Full Shelves Program](#). This includes essential staples such as peanut butter, granola, pasta sauce, diced tomatoes, dry pasta, lentils, chickpeas, and black beans that help food banks provide healthy options throughout the year.

Together, we are making sure that shelves stay stocked, and families have access to the food they need.



PARTNER SPOTLIGHT HYDRO ONE EMPLOYEE GIVING PROGRAM AND CORPORATE MATCH

This year, Hydro One employees and their supporters raised an incredible **\$165,130** in support of Feed Ontario through an annual golf tournament organized by their Power to Give Committee. This included a matched donation from Hydro One's Employee Giving Program, amplifying the organization's impact.

As a [FeedON](#) pillar sponsor, Hydro One helped food bank shelves stay full across Ontario by providing over **330,000 meals** for people facing hunger.



We responded when communities needed support:

Feed Ontario plays an essential role in coordinating [emergency food support across the province](#) by working closely with partners to respond when communities face unexpected or urgent need.

From wildfires and floods to infrastructure failures and food shortages, we helped supply emergency food support to communities in urgent need, including Gravenhurst, Bracebridge, Manitoulin Island, Pikangikum, Fort Frances, Kashechewan, and Nibinamik, ensuring they had access to food during times of crisis.

This year, severe weather events in southern and central Ontario also created widespread challenges, including extended power outages, road closures, and limited access to food and water. In response, we worked alongside food banks, governments, and emergency response partners to coordinate shipments of food, water, and essential supplies to affected communities.

These efforts were only possible through strong collaboration and partners. Food was sourced through partners such as North York Harvest Food Bank's FoodReach program and Food Banks Canada, packed into hampers with support from GlobalMedic, and stored, transported, and distributed with the help of key partners, including Ontario Corps, Highlight Motor Group, Polaris, Regional Food Distribution Association (RFDA), and The Salvation Army. Additional financial and food support was provided by Hydro One, Ontario Power Generation, and Farm Boy.

Across the province, local food banks rose to the occasion by operating in difficult conditions, supporting emergency shelters and warming centres, and ensuring their communities had access to food and support when it was needed most.

Together, these efforts highlight the strength of Ontario's food bank network and the power of partnership in helping communities respond to a crisis.

Feed Ontario and food banks across the province share a commitment to ensuring that every person, family, and community can access the food and support they need, no matter where they live.

Together, we are working to strengthen equitable access across the network by identifying shared priorities, building strong partnerships, and developing solutions that help food banks better serve their communities. This includes sharing warehouse space and resources, creating new programs for food banks in remote and underserved areas, and expanding opportunities for collaboration and knowledge-sharing across the network.

This work is guided by Feed Ontario's Network Equity Committee, a group of leaders and representatives from food banks across the province who bring diverse experiences and perspectives to help strengthen food access and advance equity throughout the network.

When food bank visits went up, our partners responded.

As food bank visits continued to rise across Ontario, our corporate and retail partners responded with generosity, innovation, and a shared commitment to helping communities facing hunger. Through food donations, funding, and investments in food bank capacity, they helped strengthen our network's ability to respond to growing demand and support people and families across the province.

metro : A partnership with lasting impact.

Metro's partnership has played an essential role in helping Feed Ontario and the provincial food bank network respond to rising need.

Through the [One More Bite](#) program, Metro connected food banks with local Metro, Food Basics, and Adonis stores, increasing access to fresh food while reducing food waste in communities across the province. This year, 282 participating stores provided more than 3 million pounds of food to 73 food banks across Ontario.

Metro also made significant investments in our network's capacity to serve communities through its [Shared Kitchens initiative](#). With Metro's support, four new community kitchens were opened at food banks in Renfrew, Orillia, Thunder Bay, and Oakville. These spaces support culinary programming, professional training opportunities, community outreach, and food rescue innovation, while creating welcoming places for people to connect, learn, and enjoy healthy food together.

Over the next three years, Metro will continue supporting the expansion of Shared Kitchens across Ontario, helping food banks strengthen their capacity to respond to local needs, increase access to healthy prepared food, and build stronger community connections.



METRO developed its Shared Kitchens program to respond in a tangible way to evolving community needs identified alongside food banks and partners. In collaboration with Feed Ontario, the initiative supports the development of collective kitchen spaces that help expand access to healthy and nutritious food, while fostering learning, collaboration and a sense of belonging within communities. We are proud to work with Feed Ontario to bring this program to life across the province and to create a lasting, meaningful impact in the communities we serve."

Through its annual fundraising campaign, the LCBO raised an incredible **\$898,841**, helping provide **1,797,682 meals** for people facing hunger across Ontario. More than **690 stores** participated in the campaign, demonstrating the commitment of LCBO employees and customers to supporting communities across the province.

In addition to fundraising efforts, 83 LCBO employees from five regions volunteered their time at local food banks, providing hands-on support to organizations responding to growing demand.

Through our Support Local in-store fundraising campaign and thanks to customer support, we raised over \$890,000 for Feed Ontario. Every donation makes an impact.

This year, individual donors contributed more than \$1.44 million in support of Feed Ontario's work, helping provide more than 2 million meals across the province. From monthly and legacy donors to those who chose to give gifts of securities, [every contribution](#) helped strengthen our network's ability to respond to growing demand.

Sharing stories that inspire action.

Through our donation campaigns this year, Feed Ontario [shared stories](#) that helped illustrate the realities of food insecurity and deepen supporters' understanding of hunger in Ontario. Together, these campaigns raised \$148,776, including our most successful holiday campaign to date, which raised a record-breaking \$88,866.

Matching partnerships with Turkey Farmers of Ontario and Evolve ETFs further amplified the impact of donor generosity, helping to provide nearly 300,000 meals for people facing hunger.

Taking action together.

Support came in many forms this year. Ontario Public Service staff and volunteers raised \$63,540 through employee-led fundraising campaigns, and Ontario Health CARES raised over \$5,200 and continues to actively fundraise to support Feed Ontario.

Across the province, countless individuals also gave their time, raised awareness, advocated for change, and donated to help people facing hunger.

These efforts show that every action, no matter the size, makes a difference.
